

Other Reading Suggestions for Summer 2025

Reading for pleasure and to keep your English ticking over!

If you liked *Home Fire*

- You could read another novel by Kamila Shamsie: **Best of Friends, Burnt Shadows** or **Kartography**.
- You could try reading another reimagining of Greek mythology such as *The Silence of the Girls* by Pat Barker (The Iliad), *Circe* or *The Song of Achilles* by Madeline Miller, *Clytemnestra* by Costanza Cosati, *The Penelopiad* by Margaret Atwood or *Ariadne* by Jennifer Saint.



- You could try reading something by another Muslim writer such as A Thousand Splendid Suns by
 Khaled Hosseini, Does My Head Look Big In This? By Randa Abdel-Fattah, The Unquiet Dead by Ausma
 Zehanat Khan or Reading Lolita in Tehran by Azar Nafisi, Moth by Melody Razak
- If you liked the multiple perspectives then try one of these: Americanah by Chimamanda Ngozi Adiche,
 The Brief Wondrous Life of Oscar Wao by Junot Díaz, Atonement by Ian McEwan, Little Fires
 Everywhere by Celeste Ng or Gone Girl by Gillian Flynn.

If you liked Top Girls

- You could read another play by Caryl Churchill such as *Cloud Nine* or *Serious Money*.
- You could try something by another great British playwright of the same era such as A Taste of Honey
 by Shelagh Delaney, The History Boys by Alan Bennett, Betrayal by Harold Pinter or Professional Foul
 by Tom Stoppard.
- If you would like to read another book with a feminist message then try *The Handmaid's Tale* by Margaret Atwood, *The Radium Girls* by Kate Moore, *The Yellow Wallpaper* by Charlotte Perkins Gilman, *The Bluest Eye* by Toni Morrison, *Little Women* by Louisa May Alcott or *The Bell Jar* by Sylvia Plath.
- If you would like to read something else set in 1980s Thatcher's Britain then try *Money* by Martin Amis,
 Shuggie Bain by Douglas Stuart, My Name is Leon by Kit de Waal, My Beautiful Laundrette by Hanif Kureishi.

If you liked Gothic Literature.

- If you feel in the mood for more classic Gothic, then Oscar Wilde's *The Portrait of Dorian Gray* is really good. There's also **Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde** by Robert Louis Stevenson; **Dracula** by Bram Stoker and Edgar Allan Poe's stories.
- Other, more modern Gothic novels are *Rebecca* by Daphne du Maurier, *The Little Stranger* by Sarah Waters, *The Woman in Black* by Susan Hill, *The Shadow of the Wind* by Carlos Ruiz Zafon; Donna Tartt's *The Secret History* or *The Lovely Bones* by Alice Sebold.

If you didn't like anything we studied!!!

- But you like football, then read Fever Pitch by Nick Hornby or The Secret Footballer
- But you're interested in social media, then read You've Been Publicly Shamed by Jon Ronson.
- But you like politics and economics, then read *Freakonomics* by Steven D. Levitt and Stephen J. Dubner or *Liar's Poker* by Michael Lewis.
- But you like food, then try Anthony Bourdain's *Kitchen Confidential*, *The Man who ate Everything* by Jeffrey Steingarten or *Fast Food Nation* by Eric Schlosser.
- But you like Maths, then try **Seventeen Equations that Changed the World** by Ian Stewart or **Alan Turing: The Enigma** by Andrew Hodges.
- But you're interested in the dark side of capitalism, then read **No Logo** by Naomi Klein
- But you like crime, then try In Cold Blood by Truman Capote, The Psychopath Test by Jon Ronson or Raymond Chandler The Big Sleep



- But you like music, then try *High Fidelity* by Nick Hornby or *A Visit from the Goon Squad* by Jennifer Egan.
- But you like science, then try *The Double Helix* by James Watson, *Cosmos* by Carl Sagan, Bill Bryson A
 Short History of Nearly Everything or Stephen Hawking, A *Brief History of Time*.
- But you're interested in medicine, then read Do No Harm: Stories of Life, Death and Brain Surgery by Henry Marsh
- But you like Geography, then read **Prisoners of Geography** by Tim Marshall
- But you like Art, then read Tracy Chevalier Girl with a Pearl Earring or Pat Barker Life Class.
- But you want novels that deal with LGBTQ+ experiences, then try *Carol* by Patricia Highsmith, Jeanette Winterson's *Oranges are not the only fruit*, James Baldwin's *Giovanni's room*, E. M. Forster *Maurice*, *Trumpet* by Jackie Kay or *Orlando* by Virginia Woolf.
- But you like travel, then try Bill Bryson, *Neither Here, Nor There: Travels in Europe*.
- But you like adventure, then try Touching the Void by Joe Simpson.
- But you're interested in war, then read Birdsong by Sebastian Faulks, Regeneration by Pat Barker or Testament of Youth by Vera Brittain.
- But you like inspiring people, then read *Dreams from My Father* by Barack Obama or *Becoming* by Michelle Obama.
- But you like computers, then try The Soul of a New Machine by Tracy Kidder
- But you like fashion, then try **Coco Chanel: The Legend and the Life** by Justine Picardie.
- But you like comics and graphic novels, then *Persepolis* by Marjane Satrapi, *Watchmen* by Alan Moore or *Maus* by Art Spiegelman.
- But you like poetry, then read try an anthology such as Best Poems on the Underground ed. Gerard
 Benson, Judith Chernaik and Cicely Herbert or Staying Alive: Real Poems for Unreal Times ed. Neil
 Astley. If you fancy reading some young contemporary poets, look up Kae Tempest and/or George The
 Poet.
- But you are inspired by the Black Lives Matter movement, then try Why I'm No Longer Talking To
 White People About Race Reni Eddo-Lodge, The Good Immigrant ed. Nikesh Shukla, Between The
 World and Me Ta-Nehisi Coates or White Fragility Dr Robin DiAngelo
- But you would like to find out more about feminism, then try Everyday Sexism by Laura Bates, Why We Should All Be Feminists - Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, Invisible Women - Caroline Criado Perez or Feminists Don't Wear Pink (and other lies) - ed. Scarlett Curtis
- But you want to read about climate change activism, then try The Future Earth Eric Holthaus, The
 Story of More Hope Jahren, No One Is Too Small to Make a Difference Greta Thunberg or This
 Changes Everything: Capitalism vs. the Climate by Naomi Klein
- But you want to read about mental health and wellbeing, then try It's Not OK to Feel Blue (and other lies) ed. Scarlett Curtis, Notes on a Nervous Planet by Matt Haig, How to Fail Elizabeth Day or Mad Girl by Bryony Gordon
- But you want to read non fiction about LGBTQ+ experiences, then try All Boys Aren't Blue by George M
 Johnson, Fun Home by Alison Bechdel or Naturally Tan: A Memoir by Tan France.
